The AOA has issued new guidelines for CME credit. They have eliminated some categories and revised others, thus reducing the number of subbcategories. The total number of Category 1A CME credits has not changed (a minimum of 150 hours in a three-year period), but the standards for being in compliance with the requirement HAS changed. A standard is in place which requires a minimum of 50 hours credits per 3-year period their specialty. These credits may for those board certified or board eligible. be obtained in either Category 1 or 2. Although credits are given for miscellaneous meeting within your institution, committee meetings, the specific requirement is that the 50 hours be obtained in the individual's specialty - in this case, Pathology, i.e., the Midyear Tutorial and Annual Meetings. The ADA has consolidated their standards in a small booklet.

"OTTERBEIN DRESSLER, DO MEMORIAL LECTURE presented by Onald W. Hendrickson, DO - 1988
December 6, 1988, Las Vegas, NV

I welcome you all to Las Vegas, and the celebration the city has prepared for the annual meeting of the American Osteopathic College of Pathologists. I am certain that all of you appreciate the extent of the respect and adoration that has been accorded our outstanding and venerable organization. It is with considerable pleasure that I am permitted to share with you some of my thoughts concerning 'The Art of Professional Survival — and Beyond.' My hope is that you will indulge me by permitting me to present these thoughts in a somewhat autobiographical fashion enabling a review of different phases and my personal mechanisms allowing for professional survival.

Dr. Otterbein Dressler's concepts and attitudes concerning one's professional survival and beyond are indelibly imprinted on many of these observations, since I was most fortunate to have him as my mentor, teacher and friend during my residency training program in Pathology at Detroit Osteopathic Hospital during the last three years of the 1950's, and considerably later on in practice. Dr. Dressler believed in the richness of the adventure and diversity of life's experiences, and he imparted to me the necessity of attempting to seek that richness regardless of the accepted norm in a situation. It is with deep friendship and reverence that i invoke his memory in my presentation.

It would be presumptuous and foolhardy for me to pretend to be an expert in giving specific advice to any of you concerning the correct approaches and techniques, so I obviously won't do that: but hopefully my experiences will be of assistance in the context of how 'one guy done it.'

Following graduation from high school in Brazil, Indiana, I attended Indiana State Teachers College in Terre Haute, 15 miles West on US 40_{\circ} and obtained the admission requirements for entrance to Chicago College of Osteopathy, taking a <u>double</u> load in academics and a <u>triple</u> load in hitch-hike commuting, sorority-fraternity socializing, and participation in a memorable adversarial relationship with a fraternity at Rose Polytechnic Institute in Terre Haute (which is roughly translated 'high land'). This adversarial posture may in part have been due to the fact that I was originally slated to enroll in Rose Poly in chemical engineering, but instead settled in Indiana State in preparation for the Chicago College of Osteopathy.

One incident comes to mind which involved our fraternity visiting the Rose Poly football stadium at midnight on a moonlit night 24 hours before their homecoming game, and even though the 20 foot tall bonfire was guarded by rifle-bearing members of the freshman class, we successfully burned it using railroad fuzzee flares. This forced the

those truly outstanding osteopathic pathologists, I believe I acquired valuable precepts for professional survival.

As a bonus, I began the residency and was teamed with Dr. Richard Kotz. It would be inaccurate and unkind to say that I learned to survive professionally because I had to train with him -- it would indeed be accurate to say that my tenure at DOH was valuable and positive in great part due to my association with Richard, and my subsequent survival was enhanced considerably by him.

Leaving Detroit, I went to Saginaw, MI where I became the first pathologist and Director of Laboratories at Saginaw Osteopathic Hospital, where I spent 13 years in a solo capacity. Some of you have served in similar circumstance either on a voluntary or compulsory basis, and as you are aware, this 'lone wolf' position makes you a potentially adversarial target for professional staff members. An almost unrelenting positive attitude on your part, reflecting your apparent unfailing capacity and the certitude of your actions as pathologist in that domain, appears to me to be most effective, and along with an affable cooperative attitude, seems to enhance professional survival as well as a congenial professional atmosphere.

My last two years in Michigan were spent in an exclusive association with three allopathic pathologists in a centralized reference laboratory servicing 13 osteopathic and allopathic institutions in a 100-mile radius from Saginaw. As some of you know perhaps much better than I, an effective relationship involving such associates and clients lends to an appreciation of diverse attitudes and philosophies with enhancement of professional survival.

In 1975 I went to the Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine where I joined the teaching faculty and participated in the activities of the Department of Pathology and Laboratory Medicine where an added dimension of didactic lectures to osteopathic students was integrated.

The decision for this relocation was particularly difficult since uprooting Laura and our three teenage children in mid-school year from a comfortable home and friendly surroundings, and moving to an uncertain future in a big city was necessary. Fortunately for me, they were understanding and cooperative, so the decision wa made easier.

My desire for academic advancement was the principal motivating factor for the move, and this was satisfied over the subsequent 12 years with expansion of the horizon of both academic and practice activities in Pathology, with the added dimension of strengthened intellectual and professional survival. College and hospital committee activities and professional organization responsibilities offer challanges which can result in an expanded personal capacity with increased community recognition and professional survival.

At some point in time, either volitionally or as a consequence of internal and/or external influences or circumstances — a decision is made for or by us to relinquish our exercise of professional functions in the practice of pathology and laboratory medicine on either a full

The following information is probably one of the most important issues of the year, as it involves a change in the bylaws. Please read this carefully.

According to the bylaws, any changes must be communicated in writing to the membership at least 45 days prior to the annual meeting of the College. At the December 1988 meeting, it was recommended that these change be published at least twice. The vote will be taken at the General Membership meeting on November 14, 1989 in Anaheim, Ca.

As background, the AOA passed a resolution on recommendation of the Task Force for Alternative Mechanism for Approval of Residency Training that enabled any active member of the AOA the opportunity of being eligible for active membership in his/her specialty college, with or without an AOA approved residency training program. The AOA then submitted sample language to each specialty college, with the request that the bylaws be amended to be in compliance with the AOA bylaws. This was reviewed by the AOCP at its December 1988 meeting, but no action was taken at that time. Included below are both the present language and the revised, for consideration.

The following represents original portions of the present bylaws:

Article III, Section 2 - Qualifications

1. Acceptance for candidate or active membership requires the individual physician:

a. be a graduate of an AOA college of osteopathic medicine. Be actively enrolled in or have completed a training program acceptable to this College and the AOA.

ANNUAL MINUTES - 12/88

The following are the minutes from the last annual meeting, held December 6, 1988 in Las Vegas, NV.

The meeting of the General membership of the American Osteopathic College of Pathologists, Inc. convened on Tuesday, December 6, 1988.

The meeting was called to order by Roger J. Sorg, DO at 2:47 pm. In addition to Dr. Sorg, those present were:

Drs. Nicholas S. Sellas, Ronald Ziegler, Arthur P. Pancioli, Allan R. Fox, Edward M. Cohen, Donald C. Atkins, John R. Zond, Eugene Zuzga, Patricia A. Allen, Richard M. Kotz, Donald W. Hendrickson, Ruth W. Cathie, John A. Kline, Morris R. Osattin, Manley B. Brabb, and Jeffrey D. Morasco. Also present, Joan Gross, Executive Secretary.

The minutes of the previous meeting had been submitted to the membership prior to the meeting. The minutes were accepted as submitted, however, in a motion by Dr. M. Brabb which was passed, it was stated that future minutes would indicate by name, all members in attendance at the meeting.

The first item was a report by Dr. Sellas, commenting on the

Dr. Sellas stated that the Task Force seemed to have lost some of its momentum. Dr. Sorg suggested that the consensus seemed to be against the Task Force statement regarding board eligibility, and that we should hold firm to our residency programs.

In discussion that followed, it was stated that the College respond to the Task Force with the position that we do not recommend DO's with MD training taking DO boards, that we would welcome these individuals back to the profession and as active members of the College.

A motion was made and passed that the College respond to the Task Force that we do not approve MD trained DO's as being eligible for, and taking DO boards.

Next, the membership reviewed the AOA sample language to change the specialty college's bylaws in order that they be in compliance with the AOA in accepting DO's with MD training as active members in the specialty colleges.

A motion was made and passed that the AOA model language was approved. The College bylaws will be changed to be compliance, however, they cannot be changed without being presented to the general membership, at least 60 days in advance of the next general The Executive meeting. Secretary was instructed publish these in coming issues of the College newsletter.

In another motion which was passed, it was affirmed that the AOCP would welcome back all MD trained DO's as active members with full membership.

The next topic was the report of the Nominating Committee. They submitted two names, that Berte J. Baker, DO for renomination, and Robert H. Chatfield, DO as a new member of the Board of Governors. With no nominations from the floor, a motion was made and passed. Dr. Manley Brabb moved that the nominations be closed, that the rules be suspended and the Secretary be instructed to a vote for unanimous approval for the election of Drs. Baker and Chatfield.

The next issue was that of the gold keys which are given at the time of Fellowship. Discussion centered upon the pros and cons in retaining this tradition. A motion was made and passed that the College continue to present gold keys to the new Fellows.

Also discussed was the possibility of presenting outpresidents with engraved gavel as a token of appreciation of their term of office. At the present time, although the College gavel is handed down each year, there is no permanent gift or plaque given as a tribute to the individual. A motion was made and passed, that each president be given a gavel to commemorate his term of office.

MEMBERSHIP CATEGORIES


CALL TO MEETING



ANNUAL AWARDS

In 1959, Dr. Otterbein Dressler gave the A.T. Still Memorial Lecture at the AOA meeting.

Following his death, the College decided to further

honor Dr. Dressler and created the Otterbein Dressler Memorial Lecture, with the first one noted as being presented in 1977 by Dr. Boyd B. Button.

It is with great pleasure that I announce the name of **Dr. Leo Stein**, who will present the Memorial address this year.

In 1954, Dr. Stein graduated from the Philadelphia College of Osteopathy. He interned at Osteopathic General Hospital of Rhode Island, completed his residency under the direction of Dr. Miguel Alvarado, and became certified in 1963.

He became a Candidate Member of the College in 1960, and an Active Member in 1963. Stein was highly involved with College activities, and assumed the position of President during the year 1969-1970. continued playing an active role following his presidency Secretary-Treasurer from 1970-1974. Dr. Stein was honored with Fellowship 1972.

Dr. Stein was head of the Department of Pathology at the Chicago College and held the faculty title, "Professor of Pathology". He later relocated to work in Traverse City, MI, where he was also a member of

the MSUCOM faculty, as Adjunct Professor of Pathology.

Dr. Stein retired in 1985 and became a "Life Member" of the College. He and his wife are enjoying retirement, filling the hours now as Captain Leo, and his wife (the Admiral!), aboard their live-aboard yacht.

The second award which will be presented by the College this year is the Distinguished Service Award. First created in 1975, it was known as the "Pathologist of the Year", with the name changed to the present "Distinguished Service Award", in 1983.

It is again with great pleasure that I announce the name of this year's recipient, Dr. Morris R. Osattin.

Dr. Osattin, graduating from PCO, interned in Bangor, ME. Then, it was residency training under the guidance of Dr. Dressler in at PCO, with certification in 1954.

Dr. Osattin became an Active Member of the College in 1952, and has continued to be highly visible in AOCP activities. He was President in 1979-1980.





Those attending the Annual Meeting had the distinct pleasure of hearing Dr. Leo Stein present his Otterbein Dressler Memorial Address. For those unable to attend, it is printed in its entirety.

With the advent of the multichannel analyzer came an of unprecedented overutilization and costs, as we were deluged with generation generation after of machines and new tests. heralded the onset of mindless technology and the demand for faster and faster turnaround time, often with little or no change in patient outcome. should have objected to the abuses that followed, but more often, we abetted them. I have always felt that in-hospital tests should be ordered specifically in relation to signs and symptoms. Screening profiles should be done on an outpatient basis and paid for by the individual who wants to know and not by our common insurance carrier. Individual are inexpensive, but collectively, as profiles, they represent an enormous financial burden based on the ratio of negatives: positives, and are very cost inefficient.

Over the years, the scope of practice of pathologists has narrowed markedly and this has paralleled the attrition in fields, due to development of sub and superspecialists. If you consider that each of these individuals is trained and sent out into the world to set up his own service, (there is, of necessity,) over-equipping, over-staffing, and overservicing of patients where often there was questionable need for this service to begin with.

Once established, there is a need to support this service. We are all familiar with these kinds of excesses. It has been estimated that each new doctor costs the system approximately \$300,000 per year. We are all

aware of the reported abuses of coronary bypass surgery. When the fee for colonoscopy was \$75.00, I averaged one or two biopsies per day. When the fee went to \$250.00 with biopsy, the number of biopsies increased markedly.

have seen an oncologist deplete a blood bank and use many thousands of dollars in type-specific platelets on an elderly leukemic patient, only to have that patient expire shortly thereafter. It has been reported at one center, a liver transplant was performed on a 76 year old female at the of \$240,000. I have recently heard of a center for "nearly drowned" children where 22 patients are maintained in a vegetative state.....for how long, and at what cost? suggest that it unconscionable to squander resources when so many are lacking even minimal medical care. Exciting technological marvels are justifiable only when basic care is available to all.

For pathologists, the automated analyzer heralded the end of his dominion in the clinical lab. The day of the pipette buret was gone. Technologists could run the lab, and good clinicians could interpret the results. We were no longer needed as consultants in these areas. In the early 70's, this College adopted the concept of Clinical Laboratory Medicine, after Miale, but it was too late. At the same time I urged pathologists to assert their position as physicianconsultants, rather than people who "read tissue", and to raise their interpretive fees to a professional level. rational for these low fees was that our reimbursement came

for years. Today, we are reinventing the wheel. In the 50's and 60's we had the Atherogenic Index. In the 70's it was Levy and Friedrickson and Lipoprotein 'phoresis. I have often asked, if atherosclerosis is the result of circulating lipids, then why the selectivity and localization of lesions? Might we be dealing with a primary vascular lesion?

People have changed lifestyles to change numbers which may have no meaning. Unscrupulous doctors and food companies are making enormous profits on the fears of a bewildered public. Recently I was in a mall, when some individual walked in and set up a table, two chairs and machine, together with a sign offering a cholesterol count for \$6.00. I don't know how you count a cholesterol, but the faithful lined up in droves to give the man the \$6.00. has been shown that worry and stress will significantly raise cholesterol levels and we have given the public something to worry about. Recently, the Army reported that in one series, 70% of their cardiac deaths occurred in patients with normal cholesterol levels.

These same gadabouts have caused people to revise their diets in regard to sugar and salt. I am not aware that the ingestion of sugar can induce diabetes, nor the intake of salt produce hypertension. Where is the justification?

Weight reductions scams waste billions of dollars, yet there is no doctrine from organized medicine.

In the case of smoking and lung cancer, I wonder why there are so relatively few cases when

there are so many smokers. What other factors might be involved? There is now great concern about second-hand cigarette smoke. I would ask you to look at a major highway or airport, or even this fair city (Anaheim) for some real pollution which is destroying our world! I heard during this week, that approximately one ton per hour of toxic waste enters the atmosphere in the Bay area. Frankly, I fear the drinking driver more than I do the smoker. We fight cigarette smokers because they can be intimidated, whereas, to attack the real problem would mean giving up our cars for public transport.


This ties in somewhat with the recent cry for trauma centers across the nation with the attendant enormous cost of building, staffing, and supporting these units. It seems to me, it would be more sensible to eliminate the need, by reducing the speed of automobiles, utilizing public transportation and eliminating the drunk driver.
