It is a privilege to present the 1991 Otterbein Dressler Memorial Address, as delivered by Louis W. Gierke, DO, AOCP in New Orleans, LA on November 5, 1991

Officers, Board of Governors, College members and quests:

I appreciate and thank you for the opportunity, to be honored, as a presenter of this, the Otterbein Dressler Memorial Address.

I was fortunate to have known Otterbein Dressler during my early years in this specialty, in the late 1950's in Detroit while a resident, and subsequently after he moved to Florida in the late 1960's early 1970's. His philosophy along with other founders of our College, in the establishment of our profession within the osteopathic community, have provided me with the basis for the philosophy and attitude during my 30 years of practice in this specialty. This philosophy and attitude was basically, how we see ourselves and the practice of Pathology within the entire scope of medical practice.

This, in my opinion, is that we are and must again continue to function as physicians who are diagnosing, and in some cases treating, patients who are ill. Granted that in the past our primary efforts have been usually applied to tissue diagnosis, in our small diverticula, allotted to us in hospital basements to a limited degree anatomic pathology consultation, frozen sections, and clinical pathology. This is where many of us had limited practices throughout our careers. And for

many this continues to be the primary arena of practice. It is to this that I would like to address my remarks today.

I was recently reminded of a passage written by Charles Dickens in the opening paragraph of his classic book A Tale of Two Cities. "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of light, it was the season of darkness, it was the Spring of hope, it was the Winter of despair, we had everything before us and we had nothing before us." If we consider this quotation we can identify and appreciate the meaning, to our current status as pathologists. How then do we deal as pathologists.

The issues for consideration include manpower availability, the viability for some of our future hospitals. The contrast between academic pathology in our medical schools and private practice of pathology, in community hospitals.

There is the practice of pathology with regards to pathologists in the day to day activities. This is that our traditional function has been as a facilitator. It has kept us somewhat removed and attenuated the traditional patient-physician relationship. This practice of facilitator, as we traditionally know it, needs to be revised. In order to keep pace, provide a basis for our future and to advance the practice of pathology within this decade and into the 21st century, pathologists will need to modify their current role, which will ultimately provide the forum for physicians, pathologists to survive the changes which are occurring.

This role change will consist of the transition from facilitator to active direct patient care, by taking an aggressive role in diagnosis, and becoming an active participant in clinical operations within the laboratory, hospital and clinics.

The initiation and continued aggressive role can manifest itself along forms. Essentially four routes. One is to become a primary consultant. Primary consultation can be achieved, in the clinical setting, within physicians' offices. This is especially true with implementation of long overdue requirements of physicians office laboratories as specified in CLIA 88 regulations to adhere to this same quality assurance requirements, long established in hospitals and commercial laboratories. Two, within the hospital at the bed side by active patient visits, either via direct patient consultation and/or chart review, ordering duplication, interpretation, utilization, quality of medical care with appropriate recommendations. Three, within the

laboratory, active participation in clinical reviews specifically in the form of interpretive reporting. Four, a form of aggressive active participation in diagnosis. Fine needle aspiration biopsy readily available for initiation. Increasing numbers of pathology groups and individuals are involved in fine needle aspiration biopsy, to the level that in some areas, separate clinical services are providing specimen collection with direct diagnosis by pathologists. All of the above activities are separately billable, through third party reimbursement, Medicare or Medicaid. The need for these physicians services is evident and why shouldn't pathologists, as physicians, participate in these forms of clinical care as readily as any other physician.

There are some things that may modify or inhibit the above which specifically are: The closing of many urban hospitals i.e., in our area of the 82 hospitals, 10-20 years ago 18-20 hospitals have been forced to close, because of lack of financial support by governmental sources. A second modifier is the developing potential manpower shortage that is looming on the horizon. Ten or fifteen years ago there were significant reserves of pathologists to the point where pathologists were in excess.

Currently, at least in the osteopathic profession we are more or less holding our own, although the supply is dwindling, especially in the academic setting. There needs to be a mechanism to provide osteopathic pathologists, not FMG's. The future looks bleak, unless we can stimulate students in osteopathic medical training to consider the practice of pathology and encourage this available new talent from the academic ranks of our osteopathic educational centers.

The reimbursement for solely academic pathologists, needs to be improved to compete with private pathology services. This is probably the most difficult hurdle to overcome. A significant number of hospitals have students rotating at the 3rd and 4th year levels from many of the colleges who should be cultivated, by the active participation of pathologists in their hospital experience. A degree of student stroking would provide an avenue for further recruitment. Much of the decision of students to pursue various avenues of practice could be initiated by the pathologist as a positive role model that will stimulate the student to pursue a career in Pathology.

The active participation of pathologists in patient care, by one or all of the four avenues discussed, will augment the economics of the hospital based pathologist through their direct ability to bill for services. For those who teach and still profess that it is the principle and not money, they will have the satisfaction of direct patient participation in diagnoses and treatment. I am sure that better salaries will significantly improve the education of osteopathic students.

So as one of your peers who has observed the changes in pathology and the growing external pressures from managed care such as governmental agencies, HMO, PPO, and various local county and utilization

review agencies, the direct participation by pathologists will provide a new challenge for the pathologist physician and return them to a role of active patient care rather than the facilitator role of the past. This concept may be difficult to adopt and initiate. But, unless we as pathologists change our role in patient care, our specialty will continue to be eroded by other physicians and non physicians.

The same enthusiasm must be directed toward our college to insure its future. I have confidence in our ability to adapt the specialty of Pathology so it will prevail and grow. With this we can return to the Dickens quotation and enjoy the best of times, grow in this age of wisdom, believe in the season of light and relish in the Spring of hope, so we will continue to have everything before us.

Thank you all for your presence and attention here today. I look forward anxiously to the continuation of this viable College, especially as we adapt for the future.





"Biopsy specimens from the mission hospitals are received in Nairobi where the volunteer pathologist grosses them and after a technologist has prepared the slides he interprets and then reports the diagnosis. The aim is to staff the laboratory with two pathologists per month, one arriving at the beginning and one at mid month, so that there is a maximum overlap."



PRESIDENT'S REPORT
Berte J. Baker, DO, President AOCP
(dated March 6, 1992)

- "My Inaugural Statement in November focused on four specific topics. The following report is an update.
- 1 The Resident Paper Competition was pursued by Dr. Hynes-Longendorfer with zeal and must be considered a success to her credit. She will provide details in her eport.

- 2 The budget proposal from the Executive Director was mailed to the Executive Committee of the Board with Resolutions. The written response was supportive. No negative responses were received. The Board is in agreement that the recent significant losses are not in the best interest of the A.O.C.P. and we will continue to study several financial options concerning cost reduction and revenue increase. These options include:
- a) Cost containment guidelines for Program Chairs,
- b) Enforcement of meeting meal ticket reservations,
- c) Appropriate dues increase,
- d) Membership recruitment, and
- e) Scrutiny of operating expenses.
- I anticipate that this item will take up much of the Midyear Board Meeting.
- 3 The Laboratory Inspector Training Program has been coordinated with College of American Pathologists (C.A.P.) and a San Diego laboratory to be included in the Annual Meeting in November. John Harbour, MD, will begin with a post-banquet didactic session for two hours Monday, November 2. The following morning five C.A.P. trainors and a maximum of 20 A.O.C.P. trainees will complete a mock inspection of Allied Clinical Laboratories about three miles from the meeting center. Certificates will be issued to those completing both sessions and a list forwarded to the A.O.A. The C.A.P. is anxious to sign up all trainees for their inspection program which allows inspectors to inspect within their own state.
- 4 The Federal scene is quite interesting and several developments are inter-related:
- a) Dr. Fogel reported that the A.O.A. appointed a general practitioner to serve as the profession's representative to the C.D.C. rather than a pathologist.
- b) The C.D.C. has requested guidance for the implementation of CLIA which puts the G.P. representative in an interesting position.

c) C.O.L.A. (Commission on Laboratory Accreditation), a private concern, hopes to have deemed status fromHCFA by July, 1992. C.O.L.A. has requested membership mailing labels from the A.O.A. and access to its members for marketing, while refusing opportunity for osteopathic leadership in its ranks. The A.O.A. declined the label hand-over initially. The G.P. representative hence suggested that the A.O.A. should contemplate a parallel organization to C.O.L.A. and also seek deemed status. It has been revealed that C.O.L.A. would consider creation of a seat on their board for an A.O.A. member if the March A.O.A. Board meeting allows a \$10,000 contribution to C.O.L.A.

I believe it is important for the A.O.C.P. to thoughtfully consider the implications of biennial C.O.L.A. inspections in osteopathic physician office laboratories.





Most residency program end the year June 30. All residents are required to submit documentation for each year of training




within 30 days of the completion of that year. This is to be submitted to the AOCP Evaluating Committee for its recommendation to the AOA Committee on Postdoctoral Training. Reports must be received by September 15, 1992 to be considered this year.

If you are in an DO training program, the reports are to be sent directly to this College. If you are in an MD program, or military, the reports are to be sent to the AOA, which will then forward them here. Be certain that you to allow extra time for this additional transfer of documentation. Military and MD trained residents should request forms from the AOA - 800/621-1773. They are not provided by the AOCP.

The next Evaluating Committee meeting will not take place until March 1993.

Two reports are required, yours, which demonstrate your participation in the program, and one from your program director. His/hers will indicate satisfactory completion of that training year. Additionally, one research paper is required by the College during the four-year program.

It is important to send in reports on time, particularly if this marks the completion of your program. A delay in reports can result in a year delay in applying for board eligibility, as the deadline for completed applications admitting a candidate to the certifying examinations is October 1. The AOBP looks to the College for a recommendation of "Approved and Program Complete".








ATTENTION RESIDENTS




