
1992 Slide Study Box Diagnoses

THE AOCP BOARD OF GOVERNORS met in San Antonio, TX just prior to the Midyear Tutorial. In addition to the usual business conducted, a few topics were discussed which should be brought to the attention of the membership.



First, the Annual Meeting is in Boston, October 10 - 14, 1993, with the AOCP Board meeting at 5:00pm on Sunday afternoon. The general membership is welcome to attend this (and every Board) meeting.

An agenda is prepared in advance and mailed to the Board. Any member of the College is welcome to submit an agenda item. If you want to place an item, please send it to this office no later than August 20, 1993 In order for It to Included.

The reason for this early date is that agenda books are mailed to the Board approximately on month prior to the meeting, allowing adequate time for preliminary review.

The General Membership meeting will be held immediately following that of the Board. One of the meeting discussions is expected to be revisions to the Bylaws, Rules & Regulations. Dr. Robert S. Bear and his committee have been diligently working on this. All revisions will be sent to the membership at least 45 days prior to the annual meeting, either via the newsletter or in a separate mailing.

Probably, as in the past, the College will not be "assigned" to a particular hotel. Also, the various food and social activities may be at different hotels. This information is not conveyed to the colleges until a month or less before the meeting. The only information to date is that a majority of the sleeping rooms are to be at the Marriott Hotel Copely Square.

The AOCP dinner and luncheon will require prior reservations. Tickets for our food functions will be available directly from this office.

Finally, preliminary arrangements for the 28th Midyear Tutorial have been made.

Michael D. Smith, DO will chair the Midyear March 4 - 6, 1994 in Orlando, FL

A change will be made on midyear registration forms. Beginning this meeting, registration fees will only reflect the charge for the CME hours. Luncheon and dinners will be priced on a separate basis. This will allow financial consideration to those who may be arriving late and missing dinner Friday evening, or the opportunity to either join the group or go to your favorite restaurant.

As soon as contract negtiations are concluded, more detailed information and a tentative program will be sent you. In the meantime, March 4 - 6, 1994 in Orlando, FL (See page 3 for Dr. Pancioli's report to the Board...)

The following is a report from Robert M. Fogel, DO, AOCP representative to the AOA Federal Health Council:

"I was pleased to represent AOCP at the Council on Federal Health programs on January 29, 1993. During the last few meetings I had responded with alarm at numerous AOA responses to CLIA. An AOA board member, GP, had been appointed as the AOA representative to COLA -Committee on Laboratory Accreditation - which was co-sponsored by CAP. Pathology representation was bypassed since the AOA is primarily concerned with the interest of general practitioners. A former president of the AOA conceded the point.

Consequently, I was thrown a bone and asked to attend a special Thursday afternoon meeting, during which CAP presented a laboratory accreditation cost package which could be submitted under the name of the AOA to all its practitioners. The CAP presentation was smooth, as you would expect, and of course CAP stands to gain \$300 to \$500 per estimated 2500 participating osteopathic practitioners. The AOA leadership then inquired whether the AOCP could offer a competing program of Check Sample accreditation while guaranteeing a profit to the AOA. I again discussed with Roger Sorg (DO) the feasibility of us getting involved in such a program, and again we both agree that volume is essential for cost-effective operation, and we cannot compete with CAP.

The major part of the main meeting was devoted to an anticipation of the health care package to be promoted by the new President. Issues of cost containment, managed competition, access and universal coverage, insurance market reform, and tort reform were reviewed. Reimbursement for graduate medical education was briefly discussed.

There are basically two competing ideas:

- 1. Managed competition, throwing all medical providers into a pot and taking the low bid; or
- 2. The apparently less popular Canadian model with universal coverage supported by the government with limitations on fees and some rationing of care. Such rationing would also be evident in the managed competition program.

The most dangerous aspect of managed competition is that we, the Osteopathic profession, a minority group, lose the protection of the federal government, while competing with the sharks. Indeed, this has already been experienced in various parts of the country. The managed competition idea fosters the creation of an adversarial relationship of one health care provider network against another. DO's have been excluded from some programs in Phoenix and Kansas City; and in Arlington, Virginia a single hospital was awarded the contract, the other four hospitals completely losing out. If a practitioner had been on the staff of the

winning hospital, he would survive. If she had restricted her privileges at the losing hospitals, she lost. I think we can also see evolving extreme measures to restrict hospital staff membership and privileges.

I am personally frightened by the managed competition concept, which also allows a continuation of the 10 - 20 percent administrative cut for the insurance industry. Although you're probably more familiar with the Canadian model than I, the folks from up North seem to have developed a comprehensive, humane and efficient system without the brutality of open market warfare. Orthopods and ophthalmologists don't need to make 2 million a year. I'm sure the orthopods would be happy with a half a million and tort reform". (Signed) Robert M. Fogel, DO

ATTENTION RESIDENTS

Now is the time to begin thinking about training reports, especially if you complete your program in June. All residents in either a military or AOA-approved allopathic program are to send a Resident's Report and Program Director's Report to the AOA within 30 days of completion of that training year. These reports are on AOA forms, supplied by the AOA.

One original paper during the four-year program is required, which can be submitted any time during the program. This paper can also be submitted to the College Editorial Committee for the Paper Competition, and still "retain publication rights".

Report to the Board of Governors 3/93 Arthur P. Pancioli, DO

The office of the President continues to be active in many areas in an effort to increase membership, improve financial status and reporting and increased interaction with the AOA. In those endeavors, Joan Gross, Executive Director, has been very active and successful in addressing those issues, as well.

College statistics as of this meeting include 106 Active, 36 Candidate (up from 11 in '88-'89), 4 Associate and 37 Life members for a total of 183. We currently have the largest number of candidate members ever assembled. Appreciation to Ms. Gross for her efforts in locating and contacting each of these individuals and

obtaining their applications. No less than 99% of these physicians are in allopathic/military residencies. Only by recruiting these doctors can the College continue to exist and grow.

The financial status of the College is still fragile but growing more stable. Expenses are being closely controlled.

Dr. Lillian Hynes-Longendorfer has been appointed by this office as a voting rep from the AOCP to the AOA House of Delegates, pursuant to the AOA bylaws change in 1992, allowing affiliate colleges to have a voting member. Dr. Hynes-Longendorfer has expressed great interest in this activity. As a member of the College Board, she will keep us apprised of their activities.

One of the most important accomplishments includes completion of the Basic Standards in Anatomic and Clinical Pathology and Basic Standards for Subspecialty Training in Forensic Pathology. These were submitted to the AOA for final approval.

Letters have been sent to four physician members in response to AOA President Edward Loniewski's request for pathology representatives to act as governmental advisors on behalf of the AOA and AOCP.

A number of issues have arisen in recent months and will need to be addressed in the near future by AOCP officers and membership. Recertification is mandated by the AOA and will need to be in place by 1995. The form and manner remain ethereal. Larger organizations such as CAP may develop a process that will be acceptable to all interested agencies and one that may be adoptable to our own purposes. This subject will require specifics in the near future.

The by-laws of the AOCP are currently being studied and revised by Dr. Robert Bear's committee.

The AOA has professed downsizing and dispersion of responsibilities to affiliates, including CME approval. Following mandates by the FDA, current standards for approval of CME programs has come under close scrutiny. The AOA is introducing new requirements. Latest information is, each specialty college will be required to become individual CME sponsors with specific criteria and documentation for programs.

Dr. David Jadwin, AOCP Board, has suggested developing a FAX network for dispersion of information to the membership. FAX numbers will be in the directory ('93-'94)

A job description for the Executive Director has been formulated and this office has also directed that a manual of standard office procedures be developed. Respectfully submitted,

Minutes - November 1, 1992 General Membership Meeting

The meeting of the General Membership of the American Osteopathic College of Pathologists, Inc. convened on Sunday, November 1, 1992 (in San Diego, CA). It was called to order by Berte J. Baker, DO, President, at 7:45pm in the Marriott Marina Hotel.

PRESENT:

Berte J. Baker, DO, President, Arthur P. Pancioli, DO, President-elect, Geoffrey S. Weisbaum, DO, Vice President, Robert S. Bear, DO, Acting Secretary-Treasurer, Robert H. Chatfield, DO, Lillian M. Hynes-Longendorfer, DO, and Joan Gross, Executive Director.

Other members included Drs. A. Fox, R. Greiner, D. Jadwin, M. Smith, N. Sellas, T. Shild, D. Steventon and two additional, (names illegible).

MINUTES - The minutes of the previous meeting, November 4, 1991 were submitted earlier with the newsletter. The minutes were approved as presented.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT - Berte J. Baker, DO (Although stated as being given the next evening, it is included next.)

"It has truly been an honor to serve in the capacity as president of this specialty college. The year has been an active one and the tasks completed required the cooperation of the Board officers and numerous members, some of whom had never been invited to participate in an ongoing project. The four goals mentioned in my inaugural address one year ago have been accomplished. They included:

- 1. Revival of the resident paper competition with a cash prize for the winner
- 2. Adherence to the first budget ever proposed for the AOCP. The financial hemorrhage has been clamped, but some healing must now follow.
- 3. Training of about twenty AOCP members for laboratory inspectors will be completed at this meeting. This program has been coordinated with the College of American Pathologists.
- 4. The AOA has elected to participate with COLA in order to inspect the implementation of CLIA regulations in the physician office laboratories.

The lingering project of forensic training program basic standards has also been completed and presented to the AOA.

We have responded to queries from the AOA concerning some decentralization of services and the granting of full and equal approval of all CME credits from recognized courses.

This year we received 11 candidate members and 5 active members.

Congratulations are due to President Pancioli who will continue an active agenda in the year ahead. Respectfully submitted, (BJB 10-31-92)" The report of the President was approved as presented.

Dr. Bear read the financial balances for a total of \$53,676 total. He stated an improvement was shown with no CD's cashed. He further said the Finance Committee was studying a proposed budget which would then be finalized with a by-mail-vote.

Dr. Baker continued by stating that the Basic Standards and Forensic Standards had been submitted to the AOA and that presented at this meeting were 11 new Candidate members and five Active members. Approved as Candidate members were Drs. S. Adams, M. Anderson, K. Fair, L. Fanelly, M. Fish, E. Joseph, R. Lyon, M. Mowry, P. Novak, G. Raffel, and R. Reuter. Approved as Active were Drs. G. Collins, R. Hartman, A. Randall, M. Robinson, and R. Zimmerman. Also, approved for Life members were Drs. R. Cannatella, R. Kotz and J. Zond.

Dr. Baker then named Drs. R. Bear, D. Steventon and G. Weisbaum as the Nominating Committee.

Dr. Pancioli addressed the issue of specialty college representation on the AOA House of Delegates re: representation/voice-without-vote. He also cited the submission of standards to the AOA for approval.

Dr. Hynes-Longendorfer reviewed the program, stating

two speakers had cancelled, however, Dr. Mote would fill in. Dr. Baker also stated that course completion included attending the AOA-CAP inspection.

Continuing, Dr. Baker cited CME problems, that physicians were paying money for (MD) courses taken, but were not receiving AOA credit; she stated the AOA would offer guidelines for uniformity in certifying examinations/questions; also, the AOA recommended that a re-certification plan be in place by 1995, with consideration of three options, CME programs, examinations, extra duties, e.g., inspections, teaching, lectures. Dr. Sellas proposed pre and post testing on our lectures while Dr. Hynes-Longendorfer suggested self-assessment be looked at as ongoing quality assurance.

Dr. Baker also stated that the AOA was cooperating with COLA and has placed an AOA Board member (GP) as liaison with COLA.

The Nominating Committee presented David F. Jadwin, DO to replace outgoing Past President Dr. Ronald Ziegler, and re-appointment of Robert A. Kurtzman, DO to the Board. With no nominations from the floor, both Drs. Jadwin and Kurtzman were approved by acclamation. The Nominating Committee then presented its slate for the Board of Pathology. 

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT ARTHUR P. PANCIOLI, DO

Dear Colleagues,

It has been an honor to have served as President of the AOCP this past year. I wish to extend my deepest gratitude to all of the membership for that privilege. The experience was gratifying, enlightening, and certainly educational. I truly hope in some small measure that I have made a contribution to the College and to you, my colleagues.

As the year of my presidency draws to a close, I would like to reflect on some of the tasks complished and to outline some of the projects

and issues that remain and will need to be addressed in the future.

There were a number of major accomplishments throughout the year. One was finalizing the Basic Document for Forensic Pathology Training through the AOA. The entire project was over three years in planning and rewriting. The AOA had a moratorium on all new specialty certification until 1992, but we were ready to submit at the moment that was rescinded. All levels of approval have been completed and the American Osteopathic Board of Pathology is currently composing an examination for Forensic certification.

Next, somewhat less dramatic, but certainly no less important, was the rewriting of Basic Standards for Anatomic Pathology/Laboratory Medicine. This was submitted at the same time as Forensic, also receiving final AOA approval.

Another accomplishment this year was for the AOCP to become an AOA-accredited CME sponsor. The College submitted a document to the AOA which was subsequently approved. The College in now in compliance with newly

published (and required) FDA standards.

One of the most important efforts of the year (and for the future), revolves around AOCP membership. We have been relatively stable with 103 Active members, however, we are now at an all-time record high for Candidate members, all with the exception of two are in MD residencies. Our Executive Director, Joan Gross, researched, located and wrote every MD pathology residency program in the US, searching for DO's. (The AOA does not track those in MD programs.) Sixteen new Candidate members were the result of this effort. Without this young physician element, the AOCP would be doomed by

gradual attrition since our residents in osteopathic programs total two. Joan Gross is primarily responsible for this growth and deserves the kudos for her success. As of this meeting, our membership totals 188 - 103 Active, 3 Associate, 36 Life, and 46 Candidates.

This office has appointed Randall K. McGivney, DO as the new representative to COPT, replacing Allan R. Fox, DO. Dr. Fox has served faithfully and with great distinction for many years. He has elected to pass the baton. Randy will also be a strong voice for the AOCP in the evolution of CME changes proposed by the AOA.

Of the tasks remaining, one is the bylaw, rules and regulations revision under the auspices of Dr. Robert S. Bear. These are still in the evaluation and developmental phase. They will need to be finalized in the near future for submission to the membership and subsequently to the AOA.

As noted in previous communications and discussion, re-certification has been mandated by the government and the AOA, to be in place by January 1, 1995. This issue will have to be carefully studied and a plan(s) formulated to satisfy proposed requirements (when they are ultimately finalized and issued by the AOA.)

Once again I wish to express my deepest appreciation for having had the opportunity to serve as your President.




