AOCP
A Look at Our Future

A draft of new AOCP Bylaws will be printed in this issue or the next, timed for a final vote in San Francisco, at the Annual Membership meeting, November 13, 1994.

There are numerous changes, particularly the areas of Membership Qualifications and Categories. <u>Most</u> of these changes are mandated, others are by design.

Many remember the last bylaw revision. There was a sense of trepidation by the membership, thinking those who trained outside the profession were disloyal - at best. This thought was echoed (and reinforced) by the AOA.

Grudgingly, the College yielded and these "dissenters" /ere accorded membership, however, they were to be precluded from holding office. The forecasters of doom

were certain this concession would signal a beginning of the end. (Shades of 1962!)

Where are we today? Of the 50 resident candidates, three and only three, are in true osteopathic programs. What is the AOA position? Allopathic (ACGME) programs are to be considered "AOA-approved. ACGME training is to be AOA-approved, PROVIDING... the resident participated in an AOA-approved "rotating internship"...well, sort of...

For years, the AOA was most adamant in its stance that postdoctoral training was **only** approved in osteopathic hospitals, a prerequisite being an osteopathic internship. Those training "outside" the profession were considered in limbo. Next came AOA Resolution #104, circa 1975. Those with MD training were back "in the fold" if they took a year's preceptorship in OPP.

Ten years later, the philosophy again changed, following the AOA Task Force for Alternate Training. 1989 was the magic year. Those with MD training prior to '89 were grandfathered with AOA-approval. Now a totally new concept was in effect, but not nearly as startling as the latest change in the internship requirement!

Presently, two osteopathic specialty colleges have approved standards for a "fast track internship." Fast track means the MD PGY1 is accepted as the first year, sans the traditional internship. Development of a fast track for pathology is in progress.

Now, the AOA is meeting or has met, to review the acceptance of MD's into DO residency programs, as reciprocity. If approved, and it appears to have the endorsement of the AOA Board, it seems natural to follow that MD's will be taking AOBP certifying examinations.

ack to the BYLAWS... there will be many and/or statements concerning degrees and certification or, even omission of original, specific qualifications. This is to comply with federal and AOA policy. These changes represent wisdom, an understanding of the need for competition in today's market, and a guarantee for the future health and continued growth of the College.

Jan 1, 1994 AOA policy and procedures for both program and training approval changed. These processes now occur at the AOCP administrative level. If you require any additional information or forms, please contact the AOCP Office, not the AOA as was done in the past. Additionally, all training documents, whether for DO, ACGME, or military programs/training, are to be submitted to the COLLEGE.

NON-MEMBER RESIDENTS are always encouraged and welcome to join the AOCP, re-affirming their committment to the profession. Dues remain at \$10.00 per year during formal training programs.

Contact Dr. S. Roberto, 810/759-7565 for any AOBP information. The Board is separate from the College. Application must be completed by October 1 of each year, with examination in April.

In a final note, when you submit annual reports, <u>DO NOT</u> send autopsy reports of daily or monthly logs, only <u>TOTALS</u> of your cases. Make two sets of your reports. Keep one and send the other to me at 12368 NW 13th Court, Pembroke Pines, FL 33026. You will receive a "receipt" for what was sent. Attach the acknowledgement to your personal copy for future reference.

The Evaluating Committee of the College will take meet on September 25, 1994, recommending those who have "Program Complete" status to the AOA. If you will finish training July 1, get reports in prior to that date, allowing time for the Committee to review of your documentation.



ANNUAL MEETING NOVEMBER 13 - 17, 1994 SAN FRANCISCO CA

CALL TO MEETING - To the attention of all Officers, Board of Governors and the General Membership:

The Annual Meeting of the American Osteopathic College of Pathologists, will be held in San Francisco, CA, November 13 - 17, 1994. The Board will meet at 5:00pm with the General Membership meeting to follow at 7:00pm. The Board meeting is open to all members.

Registration and hotel accommodations are handled by the OA. The AOA will have registration and hotel reservation forms in an issue of the DO. These are to be mailed to the AOA and Housing Bureau respectively. As yet, the AOA

has not designated a specific hotel for AOCP meetings or food events.

The reception and dinner will be held on Monday evening, starting at 6:30pm. The luncheon will be held on Tuesday at noon. Both events will require reservations through the College. Physician members of the College who register with the AOA will receive one ticket for each affair. MINUTES

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING October 10, 1993 Boston, MA

The meeting of the General Membership of the American Osteopathic College of Pathologists, Inc. convened on Sunday, October 10, 1993. It was called to order Arthur P. Pancioli, DO, President, at 7:15pm in the Marriott Copley Place, Boston, MA.

Other members included Drs. D Atkins, M Biondo, M Brabb, E Cohen, L Goodman, D Gray, D Hendrickson, T. Shild, D. Steventon and J Zond.

MINUTES - The minutes of the previous meeting, November 1, 1992 were submitted earlier with the newsletter. The minutes were approved as presented.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT - Arthur P. Pancioli, DO directed a number of comments to the General Membership. He reiterated that it had been a good year for the College. He was especially satisfied that the AOA had approved both the new basic standards for anatomic pathology/laboratory medicine and those for forensic pathology. With these approved, it will pave the way for those physicians with forensic training to sit for osteopathic specialty boards.

Continuing, Dr. Pancioli addressed the need for basic specialty standards to cover other areas, e.g., a fast-track internship which would be the first PGYI year in some ACGME programs in lieu of the traditional.

rotating internship. He also expressed the need for standards in other fellowship areas such as dermatopathology and hematopathology. He again stated the AOA requirement for a recertification program to be in place by January 1, 1995.

Commenting on membership, Dr. Pancioli stated the College had reached an "all-time high" of 192 members in various categories. Further, he said there was a need for members to contact non-members and encourage them to join the College.

Discussing finances, Dr. Pancioli reported that numbers were static, with approximately \$65,000 in AOCP funds - about \$46,000 in the CD's and \$20,000 in the checking accounts, and that the income was covering the expenses.

Dr. Pancioli then discussed a conversation he had with Dr. Robert Fogel, chair of the Legislative Committee. Dr. Fogel was disturbed re: exclusion of the osteopathic physician in managed care programs; he feared the cutting of DO's out of federal programs but there was little recourse - that we can't claim intent that this be the order of business; that the "sharks rule the waters."

In open discussion it was stated that unless we are affiliated, we may be excluded; that smaller communities with DO's suffer the most; that the DO would have to align with major tertiary care hospitals.

Following action taken by the Membership Committee, the Board recommended to the General Membership Candidate members Drs. M Beckmann, D Clard, M Conti, J Felo, P Ferbend, C Flanders, M Friedman, A Fusaro, J Geimer-Flanders, J Hodge III, K Kuttner, J Lee, M Markarian, C Mason, S McLaren, W Moran, P Saber, E Selzer, G Telgenhoff, T Yates, K Williams, and A Zond.

Also presented were Active: F DeMattia, B Hon, M Litman, D Wheeler, and Associate member K Tchang. A motion was made, seconded and unnanimously approved.

The nominating Committee presented Randall K McGivney, DO to replace outgoing Past President Dr. Berte J Baker, DO and the re-appointment of Lillian M Hynes-Longendorfer, DO to the Board. With no nominations from the floor, both Drs. Hynes-Longendorfer and R McGivney were approved by acclamation.

Tickets for both affairs are required. If you register for the meeting with the AOA you will receive one ticket for each. Tickets for your "significant other" may be purchased <u>either</u> through the AOA or from the College, for \$65 and \$30 respectively.

He who tooteth not his own horn often finds his horn goeth untooteth! The American Osteopathic College of Pathologists is pleased to announce approval of a new set of Basic Standards for - PRIMARY, not subspecialty, Residency Training in Anatomic Pathology and Forensic Pathology.

This basic document sets the standards for a four-year program. The document was submitted to the AOA for approval which was granted at its July 1994 Board of Trustees meeting. Briefly, it comprises of two years in anatomic pathology with the third and fourth years in forensic pathology or the option of one year forensic and one year in e.g., neuropathology, toxicology or chemical pathology. Residents completing in this program will be eligible to apply for certification Anatomic Pathologogy/ Forensic Pathology (AP/FP).

The American Osteopathic College of Pathologists is still in the developmental stages of a number of other standards, e.g., dermatopathology, neuropathology. Additionally, it is in the process of development of a "fast-track" internship program, which will allow the resident to begin training in a facility as a "PGYI" and continue in that institution through the remaining years of the program.

Note - One of the MOST IMPORTANT ISSUES IN COLLEGE HISTORY is on the agenda for the Fall meeting.

The AOA has MANDATED that guidelines for recertification be submitted by January 1, 1995. This will no longer be voluntary! A draft will be presented at the November 13th Board of Governors meeting in San Francisco, CA, ANA Hotel, 5:00pm. All are urged to sit in on this most important discussion.

Included this month are three inserts from the AOA regarding the November meeting.

NHITE - This is the preliminary program shell for the 99th Annual Convention & Scientific Seminar. It is possible to obtain 35 Category 1A and 2½ Category 1B CME credit hours. As in the past, the AOA will be sending a program to everyone which will detail each specialty college program.

Please note two programs on Sunday - in the event you need these for licensure, scheduled is a 2½ hour Risk Management Program at 11:30am and a 3 hour AIDS seminar at 2:00pm,

GREEN - Reservations can <u>ONLY BE MADE</u> <u>THROUGH THE AOA HOUSING BUREAU.</u> No hotel will take direct reservations. Rates and preferences are listed. Hotels closest to the Moscone Center fill fast, so make your reservations early.

YELLOW - This is the Advance Registration form to be used <u>PRIOR TO OCTOBER 1, 1994</u>. By registering early you will eliminate the long, long lines at the convention center. Please check registration and guest category fees carefully. AOCP member registration is \$445, with guest registration at \$235. <u>Only these fees include tickets to all AOA and AOCP functions.</u>

There is a guest registration with no fee, however, this is only for a <u>BADGE</u>.

Please pay special attention to the bottom of the yellow page. It states there is <u>AN ADDITIONAL \$25.00</u> <u>LATE CHARGE FOR REGISTRATION AFTER OCTOBER 1 AND AT THE CONVENTION SITE.</u> Note there is also a statment re: cancellations and refunds, although no cut-off date is given.

FINALLY - In the last column is the form for your RSVP for the San Francisco meeting. Please, if you consider attending, indicate your preferences regarding reservation for both the reception/dinner on Monday evening, and the luncheon on Tuesday at noon. If you prefer, payment for these AOCP functions can be submitted with your reply - and again, eliminate standing in line for tickets at the AOA registration desk.

Residents: The next examination for certification given by the American Osteopathic Board of Pathology will be in April, 1995. The deadline for APPLICATION is October 1, 1994. 


